New clue to crib death is found

University of Michigan scientists believe they have a clue to the cause of crib death. It appears to be a possible hypersensitivity reaction," evidenced by the presence of antibodies (IgG) in lung issue of infants who had gone to sleep only to be discovered liteless an hour or more later.

Medically described as Sudden 'adant Death Syndrome (SIDS), its 'ins expire of unknown, non-accidate causes. The syndrome is

defined as the sudden death of any infant or young child, which is unexpected by the baby's history, and in which a thorough post-mortern examination fails to demonstrate an adequate cause.

Many infants die suddenly, unexpectedly, and shockingly from suffocation, brain injury, or swallowing a foreign object. They do not always succumb in their cribs, but sometimes fall from them, collapse while playing, or choke.
