In what was described as an oper-ational decision, the Oakland University athletic administration has released John Motzer as head soccer coach.

After eight years as coach at the Rochester-based university. Motzer was notified of his termination by let-ler on March 11. Motzer, like all part-time OU coaches, was operating under a yearly contract allowing for admin-istrative review after each season.

The Hungarian-born Motzer will be succeeded by Wayne Pirmann, who is the executive director of the newly formed Bonanza Express Soccer League. "We did not change coaches on the

basis of any past record." said Corey Van Fleet. Oakland's athletic director. "Our problem was that the growth of

Van Fleet stated that the principle

reason for changing coaches was that the soccer program needs to be expanded. The team, which played most of its games at Mack Park, was always a contender under Motzer. under motzer. Motzer said he was proud of the record he built up at Oakland, and he was looking forward to adding to his number of career victories.
