billion.

Fire departments responded to 206,085 alarms, which included 82,297 fires.

Fire department investigators reported 8,442 arson fires last year with a loss of \$18.8 million. Additionally, 9,394 "suspicious" fires were reported during the year. Dollar loss in these fires was \$21.7 million.

According to William Harsen. Health-O-Rama coordinator. Free medical testing will be provided to persons divided by the property of the provided to persons divided by qualified medical personnel who volunteer their time. Individuals whose tests results are abnormal for any phase of screening will be referred to their physicians for more precise tests and examination.

Of the 9,500 people who attended Health-O-Rama last year, over 20 per cent had not had a complete physicial in more than five years. Harsen emphasized that this check does not take the place of a complete physical examination.

The most common problem detected at Health-O-Rama is obesity. Referrals are made to the Michigan Heart Association, a Torch Drive agency which offers diet classes to those who are overweight.

"Health-O-Rama is not a medical treatment program. It is a screening program designed to detect early dissease in persons who may be unaware of any health problem." Harsen said. "Many diseases give few, if any, warning signs. That's why it's important to have regular medical checkups. We hope the UF Health-O-Rama will encourage eoole to do this."






