Rabbi Sperka is honored

Rabbi Joshua Sporka, rabbi eme-ritus of Congregation Young Israel of Greenfield, Oak Park, will receive the Stofar Award at the National Council of Young Israel banquet to be held in New York April 9.

Rabbi Sperka has been associated with Young Israel for the past 24 years and served as rabbi of Young Israel for Greenfield for over a decade. Rabbi Sperka is author of three widely-recognized books: "Eternal Life." a digest of the laws of mourning: "Provers to Live By." published in 1967 and later transcribed into braille; and "Ecclesiastes—Stories to Live By."
