City supports bill to limit liability

The council voted unanimously to support House Bill No. 4945, which is described by City Mgr. Robert Deadman as a beginning on the road to defining liability limits on cities, counties, and the state.

bility to that portion of the highway designed for vehicular travel," Deadman said. Sidewalks, cross walks, guard walks, roadside ditches, or other installations would be excluded from a governmental unit's liability.

"Part of the problem insurance com-panies have today is that they don't know what the risks are," he explained. "This bill would help them start."

MUNICIPAL insurance costs have

risen steeply in recent years, while lawsuits have been successfully waged and damages awarded for non-road items, he explained.

After a new design for guard rails was introduced, in which the end portion of the guard rail was buried in the ground, drivers who had struck the exposed rails previously used began suing, Deadman said.

"We believe the house bill also rec-ognizes that governmental units can-not make engineering improvements in roadways each and every time new technology is discovered."

Filing deadline nears for board


