

# Broaden your horizons with education

The Farmington Public Schools community education program is launching its spring evening classes.

With classes due to start April 10, interested persons may register before the first class period by mail or at the Ten Mile Community School, 32789 Ten Mile, Farmington from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays, or from 7-9 p.m. Monday-Thursdays.

Fees are payable at registration. Classes will be at the Ten Mile site unless otherwise indicated.

Refunds will be granted when classes are cancelled. All other requests for refunds must be made to the Community Education Office before the second class meeting. A \$2 registration fee will be deducted in the case of withdrawal. Classes are eight weeks long unless otherwise indicated.

Senior citizens, 60 years or older, are eligible for free or reduced registration fees, except in limited enrollment classes as indicated. Seasoned Citizen Cards and identification numbers are available at Ten Mile School.

Following is a schedule of evening classes.

## SPECIAL CLASSES

•Ground School for Private Pilot—Preparation for a private pilot FAA written examination is covered in this course which costs \$30. The 10-session course runs from 7-10 p.m. Tuesdays in room 7. It covers the fundamentals of aircraft structure, aerodynamics, meteorology and radio navigation.

•Instrument Ground School—Tension course covers fundamentals of instrument flying, aerodynamics, radio, regulations, navigation, meteorology and flight procedures. Upon completion, students will be awarded a certificate to meet FAA requirements.

Some trouble shooting exercises will be included in the course. Course fee is \$30 and runs 7-10 p.m. Mondays in room 7.

•Auto Tune-up and Repair—The course, at Farmington High School, uses electronic diagnostic equipment, and covers minor tune-ups and repairs. From 7-10 p.m. Tuesdays in room 107G. There is a \$2 fee.

•Know Your Car—Designed primarily for men or women who want to learn how and when to maintain their cars. The course, at Farmington High School, will be included in the course from 7-9 p.m. Thursdays in room 107G. There is a \$2 fee.

•Fishing Techniques—Improve chances of landing a fish by studying habits and life habits of the creatures from 7-9 p.m. Wednesdays in room 10. There is a \$12 fee.

•Beginning Popular Piano—Basic notation to allow students to recognize musical alphabet placement and note values and to apply them to the keyboard. More advanced students will be offered chords. Books for the

class will cost \$4. Class is limited to 10. From 7-9 p.m. Tuesdays in Room 14. There is a \$15 fee plus books.

•Guitar—Learn to play folk guitar, tunes, chords and simple melodies. Bring guitar, loose leaf notebook and pencil first night. The class meets in room 15. There is a \$12 fee. Beginning students class will be from 7:30-8:30 p.m. Tuesdays, with Beginning II from 8:30-9:30 p.m.

•Real Estate—For those interested in understanding the fundamentals of real estate. The course supplies information and develops personal competency in various kinds of transactions, basic legal documents, tract index, mortgages, contracts, real estate law, investment potential and other information. Class times are 7-9 p.m. Thursdays in room 7. There is a \$12 fee.

•Beginners Bridge (Goren)—Course for beginners, covering hand counting, evaluation and bidding. Playing of hands interspersed with instruction to assist in absorption of instruction and to aid in gaining playing experience. Class runs 7-9 p.m. Thursdays in room 16. There is a \$12 fee.

•Intermediate Bridge (Goren)—Course in play of specially prepared hands for those who had the beginner's course and/or playing experience. Play, bidding fundamentals, lead play, defense instruction and instruction of certain bidding conventions will be

covered. From 7-9 p.m. Wednesdays in room 16. Fee is \$12.

•Speed Reading and Comprehension Skills—Class in Farmington High School is designed to help improve reading rate, concentration, vocabulary and critical comprehension. The class meets from 7-9 p.m. Wednesdays in room 12B. There is a \$12 fee.

•Photography I—Introductory course deals with basic fundamentals of camera, lenses, exposure, composition, motion, depth of field, lighting, color and filters. Class meets from 7-9 p.m. Thursdays in room 12. There is a \$15 fee.

•Photography II—More serious discussion of lighting, compositions, special exposure problems, close-up photography and photographing people. Class meets 7-9 p.m. Wednesdays in room 14. There is a \$15 fee.

•Introduction to Ballet (for adults)—Teens and adults will be introduced to ballet's movements as well as technique. Class meets 7-9 p.m. Thursdays in room 13. There is a \$12 fee.

•Square Dancing III—For those who have had square dancing I and II or knowledge of the dance style. The class runs 7:30-9:30 p.m. Wednesdays in the gym. There is a fee of \$12 per couple.

•Drivers Education for Adults—For adults 18 years and older. Behind-the-wheel instruction in a dual controlled

car. Individualized schedules will be arranged. Call the Community Education Office at 477-1300 for information.

•Rent a Garden—Rent a plot of land to grow your own vegetables and flowers. Plots available after May 1. Call the Adult Education Office at 477-1300 for information.

## BUSINESS

•Beginning Typing—Basic introductory course. Drill on speed and accuracy. Class meets 7-10 p.m. Mondays in room 2. There is a \$15 fee.

•Intermediate Typing—Intermediate and advanced students work on speed and accuracy, typing letters, tabulations and reports. Electric machines are used. Classes are from

7-10 p.m. Wednesdays in room 2. There is a \$15 fee.

•Gregg Shorthand Beginners—Fundamentals of Gregg shorthand and dictation. Textbook is extra. Class from 7-9 p.m. Thursdays in room 2. There is a \$12 fee.

•Gregg Shorthand, Intermediate—Class at East Junior High will emphasize developing speed in taking dictation. Textbook extra. Course is at 7-9 p.m. Wednesdays in room 116. There is a \$12 fee.

•Gregg Shorthand Refresher Course—A review of shorthand techniques with emphasis on building dictation and transcription speeds. Dictation and transcription speeds. Textbook extra. (Continued on page 6A)
