The third group is Madras, both plaid and solid. The plaid comes in several sizes. The colors in this group are deep and strong—predominantly a dark claret, an indigo with a burlap tone in the plaid and coordinated colors in the solid.

The fourth group is a fine cotton nub teamed with an ombre floral. The nub comes in peach, buckwheat, bluegrass, whitewash and black. The ombre floral has two color combospeach or bluegrass.

Perhaps the loveliest combination is the rough look of burlap with very fine handkerchief linen. In this case the burlap is in the deeper colors and the linen is a tone of the same color. The colors are lush and wonderful after winter.

You can choose elderberry—a blue red—to be worn with pale pink, a corn-flower blue with a pale blue and a hyacinth with pale mauve. Sophisticated women will combine the colors in different ways such as putting together the elderberry with the pale mauve.
