Planting and pruning tips given in seminar

The Farmington Extension Commission and Farmington Hills Beautification Commission join to sponsor "It Might as Well Be Spring," an afternoon seminar April 18 in Oakland Community College, Orchard Ridge Campus, Building J.

The planting, pruning and ground preparation workshop and seminar sessions will run 12:30-4 p.m.

There is no charge to attend any or all of the sessions, though contributions will be accepted.

Featured speaker for the day is Betty Frankel, a botanist and author who will present a slide presentation on the perennial garden, followed by a question and answer period.

Workshops begin at 1:45 p.m.,

headed by a host of master gardeners from Oakland County Cooperative Extension Service and OCC's biology department.


Literature will accompany the discussions on vegetable gardening, annuals, perennials, herbs and pruning.

Other events offered are a slide presentation on pruning shrubs, bushes and trees, and a vegetable gardening presentation given by members of the cooperative extension service.

Bill Reed chairs the event, which is a forerunner to Keep Farmington Beautiful Month in May.

The seminar is the first of its kind for the Farmington area, and only the second held in the state.
