Students win state awards

When North Farmington High students entered their projects in the state industrial arts competition, they were hoping for at least one winner. They got three, including a first place finish in machine shop, which is a first for NFHS.

Junior Lee LaFleur, 16, captured a top prize for a steam engine, made during Fouad Baidoon's machine shop class.

"I'm extremely proud of these kids," Baidoon said.

Senior Robert Sweigard, 17, won a third place ribbon for a three-cylinder steam engine, and senior James Murray, 17, won a fourth place ribbon for a casting, a "Cobra" gear shift. Both are students of Baidoon.

All three are co-op students. LaFleur works in a grinding shop and wants to be an engineer. Murray plans to put his casting into a 1965 Mustang he's restoring. He plans to attend Michigan Technological University next year to study mechanical engineering.

Sweigard is interested in electronics and machine shop. He made the three-

cylinder engine because "no one at North had made one before."

22 OTHER Farmington students took prizes in the competition, sponsored by the Michigan Industrial Education Society and the Detroit News.

Farmington High School winners were Dave Compo, who won first and fourth prizes in drafting; Richard Ford, who won a third prize in drafting; and Dennis Sutton, Greg Rollet and Bob Lewis, who won first, third, and sixth prizes respectively in graphics.

Harrison High students who won drafting prizes are Cliff Gully, first prize; Bob Mehall, second; Blair Toney, North Farmington students in metals won second and third place ribbons. They are John Murray, Gary Lim, Jim McQuillan and Steve McLintock, second place; and Jeff Geraci and Tim McKeown, third place.

First through sixth place awards are given in various categories at the state competition held in Grand Rapids. State winners all won either first or second place awards at regional competitions.
