Lazaros dies behind bars

Peter Lazaros, whose health prob-lems frequently kept him out of prison, died Wednesday afternoon in Oakland

County jail.

The self-reputed mobster died at 1.30 p.m., twelve hours after he had been traded for chest patins at Pontia. Lazoros, 44, of Troy, had been in jail since April 13 when he was arrested and arraigned on 10 charges from five

cities. He was being held in Oakland County jail in lieu of \$124,000 bond while awaiting preliminary exam-mations on charges ranging from extortion to a nonsufficient funds

extortion to a monatorioteckeck.

At the time of his arrest, Lazaros was taken to Pontiac General Hospital because he complained of chest pains. He was on medication when he died, according to Spreen.

THROUGHOUT HIS criminal career. Lazaros sought early freedom from jail because of his health prob-lerns.

Convicted in 1971 for lying to a grand jury. Lazaros' sentencing was delayed because of heart problems. He was parole early when he complained of

similar heart problems.

He was on parole at the time of his April arrest.

According to Spreen, the mobster had an operation several months ago to implant a pacemaker in his chest.

Lazaros personal problems were compounded in March of 1977 when his seven-year-oid daughter. Ann Nicole, was killed in a car accident. The acci-dent also permantently disabled his





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
