On May 1, those from Clarenceville, Berley, Churchill, Franklin and Stevens will attend. The workshops will help students become aware of opportunities available to them in business careers and introduce them to the many programs offered at Schoolcraft. Students will be able to attend three different sessions and may select from accounting, marketing, clerk-typist, data processing, general, legal and medical secretary, real estate, general business and cooperative training. 


