LOBBYING: Passed, 295 for and 140 against, a bill to increase public and congressional scrutiny of lobbyists, those groups and individuals who seek to influence the outcome of legislation. The bill (HR 894), now in the Senate, is the first major attempt to regulate lobbyists since enactment of a loophole-ridden lobbyist-control bill in 1946.

The main thrust of HR 8494 is to The main thrust of HR 8491 is to require lobbyists to publicly file reports on their activities with the Comptroller General. Such reports would disclose information such as money spent to entertain federal officials and business relationships between lobbyists and federal officials.

Rep. George Danielson, D-Calif., a Supporter, said the bill "is designed to give us a law which is workable and which will enable the American people and the members of the Congress to know what type of activity is taking place in the field of lobbying here in the Congres."

Rep. Robert McClory, R-III., an opponent, said he liked much of the bill but could not accept its reporting requirement for so-called grass roots lobbying. Such lobbying involves an organization using such techniques as mass-mail to solicit large numbers of citizens to generate pressure on members of congress.

#### Gallons down; OCRC fuel bill up

what is is today. This is typical of the cost increases the road commission has faced for evrything it must buy to perform the necessary services.

"Our total fuel bill for 1977 was \$278,000 which compared to \$95,000 in 1967. Total gallonage in 1977 was 699,520 gallons compared to 883,816 in 1967. " Sen. Wiliam Proxmire, D.-Wisc., sponsor of the amendment, said: "There is not one government agency that cannot stand a one per cent decrease in budget authority. Why, that amount alone is wasted each year in mismanagement, inefficiency, misplaced priorities and duplication."

Sen. Edmund Muskie, D-Maine, an opponent, noted that S Con Res 80 already had been pared down in the budget committee, which he chairs. He said: "... when we say cut \$\$ billion in budget authority without saying where it is going to come from, who is to do the dirty work, may I ask the Senator?" Senator?
