## *Musicians gather for National Music Week*

The Farmington Musicals and the Birmingham Musicals have teamed up again to bring another seven days of music to Southfield's Tel-Twelve Mall in celebration of National Music Week.

Band, choruses and singers of all varieties, with music ranging from jazz to classical, from pop to barbershop, will be heard from May 7-14 under the theme "Music: Birthright of All People."

The two sponsoring groups are both members of the National Federation of Music Clubs, which mark its 55th annual observance of the week, in its dedication to the advancement of music.

Its objective is to create an understanding and appreciation of the value of music in the home, in the community, in the nation and the world.

**SHOWTIME IS 3 p.m.** Sunday, when the spotlight in the center mall focuses on Farmington Community Concert Band, a 60-member group with an exciting sound conducted by Paul Barber.

The Groves Symphony Band, a 62-member group under the direction of Eugene Hanson, join the Groves High School majorettes for a program at 1 p.m. Monday.

On Monday, at 7 p.m. shoppers will be introduced to the students of Pontiac-Birmingham Zazuki Institute in concert. Youngsters, under the direction of Jim Ryan, will play selections of Handel and Vivaldi on their violins.

The Select Girls Choir from Steven-

son High School in Livonia entertain at 1 p.m. Tuesday. The 50 voices under the direction of Lowell Everson sing both secular and sacred music.

The Neo-Renaissance Singers from Walled Lake Central High School are directed by Roger Longrie. The 20 selected madrigal singers will perform Tuesday at 7:30 p.m.

On Wednesday, at 1 p.m., the North Farmington High School Stage Band comes with its big band sound, under the direction of Douglas R. MacQueen.

The Kendallarks of Farmington, who make music fun while they sing contemporary and show tunes, stage their show for 7:30 p.m. Wednesday.

The 40 women sing under the direction of Jim Whitten.

**THE BARBERSHOP** Chorus and Girls Octet, from Southfield-Lathrup High School take the stage at 1 p.m. Thursday. The group is a newly organized chorus under the direction of Dave Jarlette.

Saturday's concerts begin at 11 a.m. with The Agnes Prentice Highland Dancers, 12 competitive dancers accompanied by bagpipes.


At 1 p.m. Saturday, music comes from the Novi High School Jazz Rock Ensemble, when the 25 piece band is conducted by Craig Strain.
