Cancer group fetes 'super volunteers'

Cancer volunteers never heard of "30 and out."

When the Michigan Cancer Foundation honored 44 of its outstanding volunteers at the second annual Volunteer Recognition Day at the Raleigh House, 30 years of service was the minimum they had labored in the battle against the dread disease.

Recognition came in a big way for them as nearly 1000 MCF stalwarts and friends turned out.

Mrs. Alice Pringnitz came west from Macomb County. At age 87, she looks back on more than 50 years of volunteering that continues to this day. Once each week, she visits the Michigan Cancer Society's Macomb office where she sews cancer dressings.

She's witnessed a lot of program in cancer research, education, service and rehabilitation and said that now that more patients are being saved, more volunteers are needed to get

them to and from treatment.

Other volunteers hit the pavement to solicit funds or do telephone or volunteer office work, a number of little tasks that help get the big jobs done.

PURPOSE OF THE recognition dinner was to pay tribute to those 44 super volunteers who have given more than 30 years of effort toward the aid and comfort of cancer patients, to recognize all volunteers who have given of themselves unselfishly and to encourage other volunteers to become involved in the fight against cancer.

The proceedings were enlivened with the antics of Sonny Eliot, WWJ-TV weatherman, the music of Jack Qualey's orchestra and the humorous musings of Edgar A. (Bud) Guest.

Honored for their volunteer efforts were Dollie Cole, Sylvia Gershenson and Mabel Small of Bloomfield Hills, Betty Williams and Ellen Whitney of Birmingham and Gladys Ottenbaker of Farmington Hills.

Also recognized for their part in founding the Michigan Cancer Foundation and continuing to serve were: Leonard N. Simons of Simons-Michelson-Zieve, Inc., advertising; Arthur Neel, dean emeritus of the Wayne State University College of Law; Dr. Harry M. Nelso, retired chief of

obstetrics and gynecology at Hutzel Hospital and Earl A. Anderson, formerly of the General Electric Corp.

In all MCF volunteers numbering 8,027 contributed 228,594 service hours last year and drove 413,246 miles moving everyone closer to victory in the war against cancer.

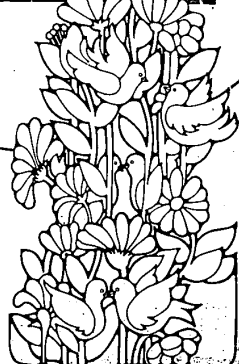

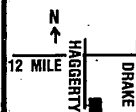
