The bowlers have done it again. This time it was the high school bowlers who heeded the call of Fred Hamlin, owner of Farmington Lanes, to engage in a bowling to aid education. More than 150 juniors responded and they raised nearly \$3,000. Of this amount, \$1,700 was raised by the Grandview and Buford schools. The money will be used for special education and aid to those with learning disabilities. The other \$1,200 was raised by the students from Gil, Longacre, and Wooddale schools. ## SCS softballers rally for win

Southfield Christian's girls proved last Monday that perseverance pays—especially when the game is girls' softball.

Christian, trailing 8-0 after the first two innings, rallied to upend Whitmore Lake, 21-10, in a Class D softball game on Christian's diamond. The victory lifted Christian to 4-1 this season.

"Some of our players were starting to think the game was over when we were down by eight," said Christian coach Dave Seils. "But I told them to hang in there. Their pitcher was a little wild, and we were helping them out by swinging at some bad pitches."

"Once we got our heads together and started thinking softball, we pulled it out. Sure, we got some

breaks. They made some errors. But that's softball."

Christian, which made 11 of its 13 hits after the first two innings, got a three-run homer from Lynn Frank in the third. Robin Harris clouted a bases-loaded triple, and Jill McCoy knocked in two runs with a bases-loaded single.

Winning pitcher Laurie Vroon, a sophomore right hander, worked the entire game—it was called after five innings on a mercy rule—and gave up four hits while striking out seven and walking nine.

"Laurie's a little young and inexperienced, and she gets upset whenever she walks a batter," Seils said. "But she has all the tools to be a real fine pitcher. She has good speed."
