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property should ever revert to general multiple use."

ADDITIONAL PARKING would be one such requirement, Deadman said.

"There is enough property to build more parking, but it would generate rather than parking," he said. Managers of similar projects in Livonia and Southfield assured Deadman that parking spaces can be reduced.

Statistics for such projects indicate that 55 per cent of the original tenants are single women living alone, which increase to 65 per cent after three years.

"Many of these seniors sell their cars when they get into a facility which has access to shopping, doctors and churches," he said.

Fire, police and water and sewer services are all adequate in the area, Deadman added. The city's public safety department has access to a 55 ft. aerial unit owned by the Farmington Hills Fire Department as part of the mutual-aid package, he said.

The \$2 million project should realize between \$55-59,000 in annual taxes for the city and school district, he said. The school district property is now tax exempt.

Resident Rick Gundala asked what protections the tenants of the proposed facility would have if they were financially dependent on the facility.

Surviving are son George; daughter Florence Panke of Farmington Hills; 11 grandchildren; and eight great-grandchildren.

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
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
