

Local artist-author inspires revival of stitchery as art

Few art forms have come as far in recent years as stitchery. And one of those largely responsible for the vastly increased dimensions of what is now considered art is Carolyn Hall of Beverly Hills.

Not only is Mrs. Hall as skilled with the needle and the sewing machine as any around, she is also a photographer and writer of no small talent.

All of these skills together are in many ways responsible for the national stitchery exhibition that opened at the Pontiac Art Center Saturday, April 22.

The artists in the invitational were all chosen from Mrs. Hall's book, "Stitched and Stuffed Art," published by Doubleday & Co., 1974.

She is now clearing away the final details on a second book, "Machine-Sewn Crafts," due out next year.

IN ADDITION TO Mrs. Hall, one of the artists who will have work in the show is her daughter, Claudia. Mother and daughter worked together on the first book just as they have for many years on stitchery projects, separately and together.

Claudia, a graduate of Groves High School, completed her BFA from Denison University of Ohio and is taking graduate work in design at the University of Michigan. She has combined her interests in stitchery, soft sculpture and photography in on a series that will be in the Pontiac exhibit.

Each piece in the series is contained within a sculpted, fabric-covered box.

"Most of these, she said, 'relate to my experiences, and I like working within a box because it is a small environment.'"

To see what is inside, the viewer may look through a Kodith, a photography process in which the negative becomes a positive transparency. In others, there may be only small peep holes to allow a view of the box's interior. Four months study in England inspired some of the scenes like an

impression created by a relic vessel in London.

Mrs. Hall, who will probably have four or five of her own things in the exhibit, hopes to finish a reassembled piece that could be either a quilt or wall hanging. The artist designed it with diagonal stripes of materials against a beige background. Then the pieces were cut and reassembled as a painter would put together a collage.

OTHER STITCHERY ARTISTS represented in the April exhibit will be Haruno Iwashiro, Jo Ann Alber, Jean Battles, Carlos Cobos, Pat Maloney, Doug Peterson, Dee Burbee, Sue Hegenbarth, Susan Aaron Taylor and Mary Jane Mazuchowski.

While most are from outside, Peterson is from Oakland University and Ms. Taylor lives in Livonia. Ms. Hegenbarth of Orchard Lake is president of the Pontiac Art Center board.

The Hall home in Beverly Hills is like a private exhibition area to showcase the talented mother and daughter artists in the family.

Claudia said she finished high school early so she could help her mother on the first book. To pass the time in the evening, she would make jewelry, porcelain with gold and porcelain with stoneware pendants, which she sold at several Art Arbor art fairs.

She once entered two pieces of her stitchery in Michigan State Fair art competition—one in the professional category, another in the amateur because she couldn't decide which was appropriate. She won a prize for each.

The lifetime and lifelike grandmother who sits in a rocking chair holding her cat is stuffed sculpture—the work of Mrs. Hall. A large red and orange wall hanging in the living room that has been exhibited many times is Mrs. Hall's. The medieval motif one is the entryway was done by her daughter.

A REAL LOOKING sewing machine, circa 1920, stands in a small hallway leading to Mrs. Hall's studio,

but it is soft sculpture, not metal, Mrs. Hall's work.

As evidenced in the stitchery work in the home, stitchery and soft sculpture are limited only by the imagination of the artist. While some of the work may have roots in folk art, just as much is totally contemporary in approach. And in the hands of a pro,

almost anything that can be made, can be duplicated in fabric and stitchery.

sionaries to Japan, arriving there in 1885 and serving for 45 years.

Mrs. Braley lived in Japan for 25 years and studied Ikebana extensively with Madame Seido Iwata, headmistress of the Seki-So School of flower arrangement.

She is a charter member of Ikebana International, founded in Tokyo in 1956 and served on the first board. She and is active in Ikebana circles in Washington, Annapolis and Baltimore. She has lectured widely throughout the country.

Mrs. Braley will also demonstrate the art of sumi-e or ink painting to enhance and complement her floral creations.

Anyone interested in learning more about this floral art is invited to attend the lecture. There is no admission charge.

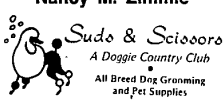

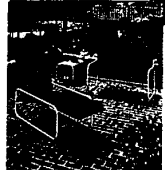
