

North Farmington bests Walled Lake Central

North Farmington's trackmen had a good day against Walled Lake Central last week.

North won the non-league meet, 120-38, and several Raiders logged outstanding performances. For example, junior sprinter Mike Miller established a Raider track record in the 100-yard dash with a :10.1 clocking. Miller also won the 220-yard dash in :23.5. Teammate Art Doran set a track standard in the 120-yard high hurdles (:14.8), and Mark Biehl set a varsity record in

the discus (148-0).

North's Paul Welch won two events, the 800 run (2:09.4) and the mile run (4:54.0). Rich Stumpf won the two-mile run from North with a time of 10:32.0. North Farmington is 7-1 overall.

In another boys' meet last week, Farmington High bested its overall record to 5-3 and the Inter Lakes League mark to 2-1 with a 114½-42½ win over Waterford Township.

Jeff Lemanski won two individual events — the long jump (19-2½) and

the 120 high hurdles (:15.8) — and also ran on the mile relay (with Dave Campo, Rick McKibben, and Don Dwyer), which won in 3:49.7. McKibben won the high jump (6-3), and teammate Jim Brancheau took the pole vault (11-6).

Farmington Harrison's boys' team was on the losing end of a 98-59 score after its meet with Waterford Mott last Thursday in the Western Six League. Harrison is 2-3 overall and 1-1 in the WSL.

Harrison's Jim Stojek won both hur-

dles, taking the 300-yard lows in :41.7, and going :15.3 in the 120 highs. Tom Reynolds was another double winner for Harrison, posting a :10.2 in the 100 dash, and logging a :23.6 in the 220.

IN GIRLS' TRACK last week, Molly Brennan won two events to pace Matt's 98-52 victory over Harrison. Harrison is 5-3 overall and 1-1 in the WSL.

Brennan won the 440 (:50.0) and the 220 (:27.5). Harrison's mile relay (Debbie Sweeney, Linda Tremont,

Dawn Johnston and Ruth Grabowski) won the 4:28.0. The Hawks 880 relay (Beth Dilley, Linda Tremont, Grabowski and Johnston) won in 1:53.4. Earlier last week, Harrison defeated city-rival Farmington High, 78-58. Grabowski won the 220 (:27.4) and the 440 (:52.0) for Harrison. Cheryl Lacey won the discus (89-9) and the shot-put (25-10½) for Farmington. Teammate Shelly Tomkow won the 100 dash in :11.7.

Services were held this morning from the Ver Heyden Funeral Home.
