The expected state-ordered addition of four judges to the 11-man Oakland County Circuit Court bench could cost the county as much as 59 million, alarmed county officials said last

week.

The state legislature is currently considering bills which would add the judges in Oakland County. The circuit court judges last month recommended that four judges be added to their ranks. Oakland currently has 11 circuit indees.

County Executive Daniel T. Murphy
and Wallace Gabler (R-Royal Oak),
chairman of the board of commissioners, said the cost of adding four judges
would severely disrupt the county

It would mean no raises, lay-offs and cutbacks in county-funded "The state Guidature is telling us we need four more judges more than wenered a lot of services." Said Lillian Moffitt (R-Bloomfield Township), vice-chairwoman of the board. Speaking after a closed door meeting of the county's top officials, she said. "The citizens want road services, public transportation for the elderly and handicapped (and) jail expansion. We can't fund those things if we're sent four more judges."

TO SOLVE THE cost crunch, county officials said the state should pay for any new costs incurred by the antici-pated four new judges.

Those costs, they said, would be high and far-reaching.
In addition to paying half of each judge's \$49,000 annual salary, the county pays for all the administrative

costs. Gabler said those costs run as high as \$300.000 per judge. He said the court's "ancillary serv-ices"—the prosecutor's office and friend of the court division, for example—also would have to be expanded.

Even the courthouse. Gabler said, would have to be expanded. Four metion godges and their courtrooms could not, be accommodated in the present confines of the courthouse. A new wing would have to be added, he said.
That, Gabler said, might cost as much as \$S million.

OAKLAND COUNTY has its back to

OAKLAND COUNTY has its back to the wall with little room to maneuver, said Patrick Novak. Murphy's deputy or intergovernmental relations.

The state has never agreed to fund costs of the mandated additions, especially to the degree that Oakland County is asking.

Gabler said the county might refuse to fund the new judgeships.

"Down the line," Nowak said. "there's a confrontation of gigantic proportions coming. We're hoping that it never comes to pass."

IN AN EFFORT to head off that confrontation. Gabler and Murphy have formed a "united front" to try to sway the legislature to cut the four-judge recommendation.
"We'll try to convince the state senate that we can't afford four judges. We're honing they'll listen to the bard

ate that we can't afford four judges. We're hoping they'll listen to the board and the executive." Nowak said.
"We're trying to send a message to the state legislature. This is no SEAITA deal. We're not crying wolf." he said. "It's going to cost at least \$5 million and we don't have \$5 million."

MURPHY DID NOT mention the amount of the pay increase for which Andrews had asked, but added that Andrews mentioned the pay level for federal district court judges. Oakland's circuit judges have said publicly they want the same salaries as federal judges—\$54,000.

IN 1976, the county's circuit judges were the highest paid judges in the state. With annual salaries of more than \$41,000 they earned more than federal district court judges. Michigan Court of Appeals judges and Michigan Supreme Court justices. Since that time, however, the salaries of the other judges have risen past the \$50,000 mark.

"Negotiations for more money are out of the question." Murphy said.
"Even if Dan (Murphy) recom-mended a \$1,000 or \$5,000 increase." Nowak said. 'the board wouldn't give it to them."

THROUGHOUT THE DEBATE. Murphy and the board have opposed any increases in circuit judges.

The board last Dec. 1 voted 23-1 to recommend that no ney judges be sent to the county. At that time, the circuit court judges had not made any of their recommendations known.

ANDREWS, QUOTING a lengthy set ANDREWS, QUOTING a lengthy set of statistics, maintains that circuit court needs the four additional judges. "We're not asking for anything that we don't need." he said. "But there's a backing building up, and we don't want to go into a crash program."
