

## Pioneers falter

# Oakland softballers fall to Grand Valley

"It's the third sport this year where we've lost to Grand Valley by one game," said Oakland University softball coach Tom Fitzpatrick, whose Pioneer softball team finished in fourth place behind the Lakers in Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic (GLIAC) play.

Oakland finished the GLIAC volleyball and basketball seasons the same way—one game back of Grand Valley. Swidzinski's goal was to finish ahead of the Lakers in softball, even though it was Oakland's first year in the conference.

But, Grand Valley concluded the regular season with a 9-1 mark, while the Pioneers ended at 8-2.

OU also encountered hard luck at the recent AIAW state softball tournament.

In the double-elimination format, the Pioneers fell to Grand Valley, 1-0, and were clubbed by eventual champion Western Michigan, Michigan State and Grand Valley.

Sharon Stickney was the victim of the one-run decision against Grand Valley. After issuing a walk, the runner advanced to second on a passed ball and scored when Laker pitcher Debbie Reynolds singled.

OU was victorious in the three previous games, however, including a 6-0 Stickney no-hitter against Ferris.

Late-inning heroics by Helen Shereda and Kathy Hewell capped a 3-1 Pioneer conquest of Albion.

Down 1-0 with one out in the seventh, Shereda tied the game with a home run. The first extra inning was all the Pioneers needed as Hewell hit a run-down home run for the win.

OU, which finished 17-5 overall, and 3-2 in its first year in the AIAW tournament, came in fourth behind champion Western Michigan, Michigan State and Grand Valley.

Leading OU hitters this year were

Hewell (.482), Shereda (.405), Stickney (.341), Janette Fisher (.319) and Sue Friedman (.295).

Stickney (.93) and Shereda (.62) were Oakland's top two pitchers.

### OU SECOND IN TENNIS

The two-day GLIAC tournament at Big Rapids saw the Pioneers accumulate 18 points, second only to Wayne State's 21, and far in front of third-place Hillsdale with seven.

Winners for OU were Terry Fuerst (No. 1 singles), Al Krapf (No. 2 singles) and Fuerst and Jim Fitzpatrick (No. 2 doubles). Those three wins gave Oakland 12 points.

Also accounts for Lee Fredrick's netters were Rick Mims (No. 3 singles) who lost in the final, as did Dan Haag (No. 6 singles). Haag and Mims advanced to the number three doubles semifinals before losing.

The Pioneers, who were tied with Wayne at 15 after first-round action, completed its scoring when Tom Simonsen advanced to the number four singles final, and Fitzpatrick made it to the number five singles semifinals.

With Haag the lone senior on the team, the Pioneers will return numerous high-quality netters from this season's squad which finished with a respectable 22-4 mark.

With the exception of Lee Fredrick's netters were Rick Mims (No. 3 singles) who lost in the final, as did Dan Haag (No. 6 singles). Haag and Mims advanced to the number three doubles semifinals before losing.

### OU '9 WIN TITLE

The first non-swimming GLIAC championship recorded by Oakland in a long time was accomplished by the Pioneer baseball team.

Coach Dirk Dieters' club won the GLIAC title without playing a game over the weekend.

Both reached OU's twinbill at Hillsdale Saturday, and, since the GLIAC does not reschedule rainouts, OU clinched first place with a 12-3 record.

Grand Valley was second at 10-6 with only two games left for each team.

On May 2 the Pioneers swept a twinbill from Ferris, 14-1 and 16-13.

Jim Kazanski hurled five-hitter in the game which featured a ten-run OU third-inning.

Trailing 10-4 after two innings in the second game, OU charged away and eventually Hillsdale was stopped 14-12 to 25-15 with the come-from-behind victory.

Oakland's first baseball championship was accomplished by steady pitching, strong hitting and superb defense.

Leading hitters were Jim Dieters with the sizzling .402 average, including nine home runs and a school-record 51 RBIs. Dennis Krych's .379 average was highlighted with a double, and Mark Bielski had a team-record four triples in batting .341.

On the mound, OU reliever Tom Libby had the lowest ERA at 2.34, with an overall record of 3-0. He was 2-0 in the GLIAC with three saves.

Oakland Community College transfer Tim Seagraves was 5-4 overall, 4-1 in the conference. His ERA was 3.17.

OU closes out the regular season by hosting the University of Detroit on Saturday and Purdue-North Central on Sunday. Both doubleheaders will begin at 1 p.m.

If the Pioneers host the NCAA II District Four tournament, it is tentatively scheduled to begin on May 18. The national finals will be held in St. Joseph, Mo.

Ineligible for post-season competition are transfer students Seagraves, Libby, Jeff Trax. Peter Lynch—all pitchers—and outfielder Jay Lentz.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE FARMINGTON CITY CODE ZONING ORDINANCE

THE CITY OF FARMINGTON ORDAINS:

The following Sections and Sub-Sections of the Farmington City Code, Chapter 39 Zoning are hereby amended as indicated:

ARTICLE II DEFINITIONS

Section 5.2. Definitions Pertaining to Building Use - ADD THE FOLLOWING:

House for Elderly: Building providing housing for persons who are:

(a) Defined by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development.

(b) If there is no such definition provided, then the age shall be years of age or older.

(a) Square feet requirement for Housing for Elderly may be reduced by 5% when a like amount of square feet common area is provided. Common area may include recreation, meeting rooms, library and other similar areas.

(b) Storage and/or Utility requirement is waived for Housing for the Elderly uses.

Section 5.8 Table of Required Off-Street Parking Spaces

ADD THE FOLLOWING:

Use Spaces Per Unit of Measure

Housing for Elderly 1 Every 2 dwelling units plus 1 additional parking space for each employee. Should units revert to general occupancy, then 3 spaces for every 2 dwelling units shall be provided.
