Area people reach out to handicapped

Life isn't always fair and the folks connected with ALYN, a hospital in Israel for crippled children, know all about that

Israel for crippled children, know all about that.

The four letters—ALYN—spell out handicapped in Hebrew but Goldie Eskins says they also stand for "all the love you need."

ALYN is a long-term hospital and school with about 100 patients, mostly from impowerished homes. "They are economically and culturally deprived homes," Mrs. Eskins said.

She added they have approximately \$200 out-patients for treatment, therapy and rehabilitation who are taken



care of in five clinics.

"The goal of the hospital is to teach them independence, giving them dignity and self-worth," Mrs. Eskin coplained.

There is a teenager named Yaffa at ALYN who moves around in a wheel-chair which she propels by breathing into a sensitive apparatus.

"Before Yaffa got her chair, she tried to commit sucide." Mrs. Eskin said. "She's a quadriplegic and there wasn't a bright future for her, but now she has hope. She's even learning to type with an instrument held between her teeth."

basy executive in Southfield who lives
in Farmington, she has come to the
fore in the challenge of forming this
new helping organization in this area.
Mrs. Mark said she has five whole
and healthy children and two beautiful
grandchildren for which she's grateful.
She also has a living reminder that
tragedy can strike anyone.

"The year before the polio vaccine "The year before the pollo vaccine was perfected, my younger sister Sandy Berlin was struck with pollo," she said. "If not for the March of Dimes, I don't know what would have happened. Today, she walks with braces and crutches and uses a wheel-chair when necessary. But she's alive.

"We're lucky and we feel we have to give back, so both Sandy and I have been active and chaired Mother's Marches for the March of Dimes, Helping cripled children is something very close to my heart."

On Wednesday, May 24 at 8 p.m. she will open her Farmington home to a large gathering of people who will become charter members of the ALYN Society for Physically Handicapped Children.

"Until seven years ago, the hospital was in a monastery." Mrs. Eskin said. "Then a new facility was funded. It's

beautifully equipped and we have a school for children below high school fevel. They are taught a vocation. "Every patient is ambulatory by means of wheelchairs and other special equipment. They play soccer and basketball and lead active lives." Mrs. Eskin said the hospital lobbies for the handicapped and tries to find housing and jobs for them. "We have to remodel the kitchens and baths for their needs so they're able to take care of themselves."

"Right now we're building a hostel. We have an excellent volunteer staff who come for six months or a year but we need to build housing for them."

She said 10 per cent of the patients are Arab, some of them having been injured in the recent hostilities in Lehanon. "We'd like to build a surgi-ad wing too, but that's in the future."
What they really want to do is to redress some of life's unfairness with a lot of love and care.
