blocks of tickets and transportation to games in season.


Although he played ball, mostly the outfield on the streets of Highland Park as a youngster and at Central High, his poor eyesight precluded a professional ball playing career for Smith.

North Farmington baseball coach Jerry Maxwell sees the situation similarly, although his team is unaffected by the recent wet weather. "We've got a lot of good pitching, so I don't think it will affect us as much as other teams." he stated. "Of course, we were playing real well, and I hate to lose the momentum we had going for us. But I still think it will present more of a problem for other teams because our pitching is deeper than most."

The inciement weather hasn't been a big prob-lem for John Harrington, Harrison baseball coach. "We won't make up the doubleheader against Walled Lake Central because it was non-leagu-there's a bit of a logiam next week, but all the other teams have the same problems. Southfield Lathrup tennis coach Ed Waits wasn't sure how the bad weather would effect his squad.
"I think it will bother some others more than us," he said. "We have an experienced team; still, it's not going to help us any."
Vestus Spindler, the girls softball coach at Farmington High, was worried about the psychological effects the weather would have on his team.

"These girls have never played a doubleheader before, and now they have two this week." Spindler said. "We haven't even had a decent practice, with all this bad weather. And with all the games we're playing this week, we won't get much of one in. We'll just have to do our best."

Lack of practice time was Southfield Lathrup track ocach Jerry Mineweaser's concern as well. "When we're unable to practice, we're going to get flat," Mineweaser stated. "Everybody gets down a little. There's no doubt it will hurt us." So, while the rainouts will be more of a problem for the thinner and inexperienced teams, no coach is in favor of them. They all agree, that while it hurts some more than others, bad weather helps no one.
