SISU MEANS power or strength in Finnish. Using the sizu of the 2,100 members, the Finnish Cultural Center in Farm-ington, which opened in 1974, was dream come true. Next goal for the group is a senior cilizen apartment complex. The center is the only one of its kind in Michigan, built with the aim of

forming a Finnish organization without religious or political affiliation to
help promote the culture.

The center's library lends books
ranging from composer Jean Sibelius
to newspapers and magazines from
Helsinki, the capitol of Finland.
A gift shop, filled with artifacts
imported from the old country, include
handsome leather boots, intricate-cut
glassware, decorative wall pieces and
ultra-modern jeweiry.
The center spansors their dancers,
who have performed internationally. It
provides activities for young people,
singles and senior citizens.
The center draws its largest crowde
on three Finnish holidays—luhannes
Day, Pikkuijoulu (Little Christmas)
and St. Urbo's Dance.

Mayfest will open at noon Saturday and run until 11 p.m. Sunday morning at Mayfest begins with a sunrise service at 8:30 a.m. followed by a pancake breakfast, and continues through 11 p.m. Monday bours are noon to 6 p.m. "Newcomers to the center will be able to find us by our Hanko Rock. That's a landmark now," said Ed Imonen.

The Hanko Rock, sitting on the front drive of the center, was a gift from the city of Hanko, Finland, that came from its harbor area. It was there that the emigrants sat awaiting embarkation to America. The rock was placed on the Farmington site last year.

The Farmington Community Center needs some REALLY BIG angels, a lot of medium sized angels, and hundreds of little angels. The Center is a valuable community project


