

SEMTA raps, spending curb bill

Oakland County commissioners are opposing a state senate bill that would curb the way the Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority alloates its funds between capital and

cates its finds between capital and operating costs.

The board voted 17-7 at its May 18 meeting to oppose SB 1843, offered by Sens. James DeSana (D-Wyandotte), Dewid Plawecki (D-Dearborn Heights) and R. Robert Geake (R-Northville). If enacted, the bill would prohibit SEMTA from using funds from the tri \$2.50 while registration tax and \$6 title transfer tax for operating purposes.

Those taxes were passed in 1976 with the idea they would be the state-local share of capital funds to improve public transportation. The tax law was so worded, however, that it allows SEMTA to use the funds for either operations or capital.

THE TAXES raise about \$12.5 million, said Henry M. Hogan, an Oakland County member of the SEMTA board. Of that, \$10 million is being allocated for capital improvements. The SEMTA board is scheduled to decide July 25 what mode of rapid transit—If any—to construct.

If SEMTA cannot use \$2.5 million operations, Hogan said, "we can either 1) cut services to Oakland County and the suburbs or 2) ask for \$2.5 million from the state general fund."

The county board's resolution opposed SB 1483 on the ground the funds are "needed to maintain present levels of services."

SUPPORTING the pro-SEMTA reso-

Opposed was Henry Hoot (R-Troy).

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The opposition was led by James E.
Lami (R-Royal Oak), who recently led
the unsuccessful attempt to withdraw
Oakland County from SEMTA. Lami
argued the bill would "prevent money
from being eaten up by SEMTA operations."
