High school girls will have an opportunity this summer to explore the relationship of theral arts studies to the business world at a National Business Career Institute for College Bound Young Worten to be held at Madonna College, Livonia.

The Institute, which will meet Sun-day through Friddly, Juise 18 to 23, is jointly sponsored by the Madonna Col-lege business administration depart-ment, the Business administration depart-ment, the Business properties of Metropolitian Definit, and the U.S. Office of Education, through the Madonna College Career Resource Center.

The young women will hear presentations by successful female executives from fileds such as accounting, finance, marketing, computers, corporate law, training and development. They will discuss their own abilities and prepare career paths for upward mobility, use a decision-making game, play computer games, and have access to the Michigan Occupational Information System.

They also will tour the Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp. headquarters and meet in small group sessions with

Males 45 years and older have left the labor force it large numbers dur-ing the last 15 years, according to a national business and consumer research organization. The trend seems likely to continue

The trend seems likely to continue but at a mixif slower pace, says a report published in the May Issue of Finance Fectia," a monthly newsletter on consulrair credit.

Currently, men 45 and up comprise only % of the finale civilian labor market, down from nearly 40 per cent 10 years ago. By 1990, they are expected to make up only, 30 per cent of the work force.

Liberalization of Social Security retirement benefits also has contributed to the trend. In 1950, the average monthly payment for male benefi-ciaries 65 and older was \$32; in 1976 it was \$292.

While the working life-time for men has been declining, it has been increasing for women, according to the report. Generally high levels of business activity, rapid growth in sectors that have traditionally employed large numbers of women, the influence of the women's movement, and legislation forbidding sex discrimination in employment all have contributed to rising female employment.

THE WORKSHOP LEADER also recommended thinking through opinions, sticking to them and not overrating the opinions of others.
