### FEA awards scholarships

Three Farmington students each were awarded \$275 scholarships by Farmington Education Association last week. A total of \$825 was donated by area teachers for the awards.

Farmington High winner is senior Alicia Bergers, who is an "A" student and active in the marching and symphony bands and choir. She is a member of the National Honor Society and gives private music lessons. Ms. Bergers plans to attend the University of Michigan this fall.

Senior Tim Kay is the winner at Harrison High. Kay is class president and carries a "B" average. He has been active on class boards since his sophomore year and was named to Wolverine Boys' State. He also plans to attend the University of Michigan.

North Farmington High scholarship winner is Steve Meschenberg, a senior, who carries a "B-plus" average. He has been active in speech and forensics, boy scouts, the Lutheran Church and is a member of the National Honor Society. Meschenberg plans to continue his education at Michigan Technological University.

Navi is one of the most prominent oriental Jews in a country dominated by Jews of European origin. Born in Iraq, he came to Palestine in 1925.

Before the establishment of the state of Israel in 1948, Navi was a member of the executive committee of the General Organization of Jewish Watchmen.

In 1948, he founded an Arabic radio station for the Hagana, the leading organization fighting for creation of the Israeli state. He continued to broadcast in Arabic until he was appointed judge in Beersheva in 1957, the first such post in the Negev region. An attorney, Navi practiced law in Tel Aviv and Beersheva, often appearing as an expert witness in Moslem religious courts.

In 1963, Nave was first elected mayor of Beersheva, a post which he has held to the present.

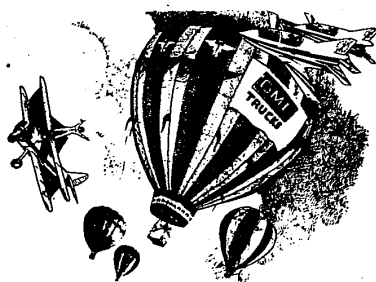
Youth Volunteers will organize this summer to help at the library and perform at children's programs. Call the library of your choice for information on organization times.

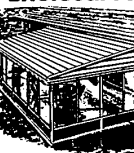
