to any one class, creed or profession, but rather affect every strata of society. Some people in public life afflicted with a hearing loss include U.S. Sen. Robert Dole, Frank Morris of the St. Louis Cardinals, entertainer Bob Cosby, and Alabama Gov. George Wallace.

ACKNOWLEDGING that the hearing impaired are facing up to their responsibilities in adapting to a hearing world, coordinators of the program said it is now the obligation of those

who are able to hear to understand the needs of the hard of hearing and deaf. Because all of us will eventually have a hearing impairment according to the Better Hearing Institute, sponsors of the hearing integration day encourage all to attend in order to pursue daily activities more fully with their own hearing loss or to better their relationships with a family member or friend who has a hearing loss.

The workshops will give individual instruction in personal grooming, how best to present their talent performance, and hints on interviewing techniques.

The one selected as Miss Farmington 1978 will automatically be a contender in the Miss Michigan Pageant in June, 1979, which may lead the way to competition in the Miss America Pageant.

Holly Ann Schmidt, Miss Farmington 1976, was named Miss Michigan last June and went on to represent the state in the Miss America Pageant last fall.
