#### Moral perspectives

# **Expedient action often** goes against morality

The debate continues about the construction of an eight-laine highway through the center of downtown Troy. A great deal of pressure is being generated by the Oakland County Road Commission and the City of Troy to build this highway because it is the most expedient solution to traffice problems and will speed development of commercial property.

From a moral and religious point of view, however, the expedient answer is usually the wrong answer. The arguments to build such a highway are all focused upon solving immediate problems. Those who support the expedient, solution say it must be approved and carried out now or there will be terrible consequences.

The eight-lane highway must be started now or there will be increased traffic accidents. Loss of life and loss of profit will be blamed upon those who caution a longer evaluation and even a reversal of the present plan. It is expedient that this plan be pressed through now

RELIGION IS opposed to the expedient solution in favor of a longer range view of those less tangible values of quality of life, community spirit, justice, and equal access to the cultural and socially redeeming values



of a community. Religion has to do with the values of caring and sharing, of nurturing and preserving symbols of value in a culture.

I recently was told about a school district in our area where the decision of where to place special education classes would probably be made by the bus drivers who would transport the children to their special classes. The school administrator stated that the classes would probably be located in a school most convenient to the bus schedules. Many more important criteria for placing these classes would probably be ignored.

The expedient solution pays little attention to the needs of people. Rather it often is made to save further problems, to save money, to remove the immediate irritation, and to

THE VERY REASON for the execu-tion of Jesus was that "It was expedient that he should die" to avoid social urnest and the reactions of the Roman government. How many times in the history of mankind have expedient decisions destroyed great persons and great resources and societies?

Fortunately, preventing the overuse of our environment and resources has become an important cause for many in our land. Cultivating and protecting endangered values in our world will require that we be more willing to oppose the expedient solution.

However, we must become aware of what great pressures are allied behind expedient decisions. Large money interests, government administrators, the profit motive and our very style of life pushes us toward expedient solutions for problems.

Religiously motivated persons will act in opposition to expedient decisions. They will raise the question of other values which may seem to many to be impractical or unprogressive. Nevertheless, this is one function of religion, to see the larger view and to focus attention upon the enhancement of human values.
