

Farmington Our Lady of Mercy and Southfield Christian recorded outstanding finishes Saturday at their respective girls state track meets.

Mercy, competing in the Class A finals at Brighton High School, scored 16 team points, good for a ninth-place tie with Lansing Sexton. Meanwhile, in the Class D finals at Lansing Sexton, Southfield Christian finished 14th with 11 points.

Mercy, which has Catholic League and regional titles to its credit this season, scored in four events at the state finals. Junior Michele Collins scored in a pair of events, taking fourth in the 880-yard run (2:18.7) and sixth in the mile run (5:20.1).

Teammate Sue Heinlen, a sophomore, finished fourth in the two-mile run with a time of 11:23. Lynn Yadach completed Mercy's scoring efforts with a 2:18.9 showing in the 880, good for sixth place. Mercy's 440-yard relay team (Terry Whalen, Kathy Whalen, Sherry West and Ann Miller) didn't score with a time of :51.4, but did establish a school record.

"We did just about what we thought we'd do," said Mercy coach Bob Kirkland. "We've had a fantastic season. I can't believe how far these girls have come in just three years."

Detroit Mackennie, paced by Denise Walton's national high school record of 2:07.71 in the 880, won the Class A state championship, scoring 41 points in the state meet. Flint Northern took second place with 24/4, and Grand Rapids Ottawa Hills was third with 23.

IN THE CLASS D finals, Southfield Christian got all its points from one girl — sophomore Laura Vroon.

Vroon, who also competes on Christian's softball team, won the two-mile run with a state-record 1:40.0, shattering the old mark by 20 seconds. She also finished sixth in the mile with a time of 5:44.0.

"She's really something else," said Christian coach Shirley Humbyrd. "She'd be a great athlete at any school in any class.

"Not only is she an all-around athlete, but she also has a 4.0 cademic average. And despite all the medals she's won, she's a reat team athlete. She doesn't go out and try to win everything war berself"

Linda Vroon, Laura's twin sister, missed scoring in the 880 (2:30.9) and the mile run (5:59.9). Teammate Julie Buller couldn't score in the long jump (14-10) or the high jump (14-8), and Robin Harris missed scoring in the shot put with a 32-0 effort.

In the Class D boys' track finals, held concurrently with the girls' at Sexton, Christian had one scorer — Tim Johnson, who finished third in the 880 with a time of 1:59.0.
