

# U of M athletic director warns

## Equal spending may end sports

University of Michigan athletic director Don Canham said inter-collegiate athletics is doomed if female sports must receive as much money as male sports.

"It cost us \$800,000 to field a football team," Canham said. "That team made us \$5 million. Are we supposed to spend \$800,000 on a women's field hockey team?"

"Anyone rational person can see that you cannot spend equal dollars on athletics in the climate today," Canham said.

Canham was speaking to a joint luncheon of Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Bloomfield Township service clubs Wednesday at the Community House in Birmingham.

His talk was held in conjunction with the Michigan Week celebration. Wednesday was Livelihood Day. The topic was the business of sports.

The University of Michigan athletic director emphasized that he is in favor of women's sports.

"No one can argue with Title IX," Canham said. "It provides equal opportunity."

EQUAL OPPORTUNITY is not

equal expenditure, Canham said. Football and basketball programs at the Big 10 schools help support other sports.

"Of the 600 schools in the NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association)," Canham said, "only 100 make it financially. Some 700-plus are subsidized."

"The University of Michigan, fortunately, is one of the more affluent universities in the nation," Canham said. "We have a 100,000-seat stadium and Bo Schlembecher as our head football coach."

Only five Big 10 Conference athletic programs are affluent, Canham said. They are the University of Michigan, Michigan State University, Purdue, Ohio State and Wisconsin.

"The Big 10 is doing things within its conference to help keep everyone playing," Canham said. "When we play Northwestern in Ann Arbor we draw 100,000 fans. Fifty per cent of the gate receipts go to Northwestern. When we go to Northwestern, we share a 10,000 gate."

"When the University of Michigan went to the Rose Bowl, we received a check for one afternoon of football which amounted to \$2 million," Canham said. "We don't keep that money. We turn it over to the Big 10 Confer-

ence, where it is split equally between all the Big 10 schools."

Money received from nationally televised games is also split equally between all Big 10 Conference schools, Canham said.

CANHAM WAS inducted into the Michigan Sports Hall of Fame, Monday, May 22. He was appointed athletic director in 1968, the fifth person to hold that position in UM's history.

He operated a highly successful sports equipment business that was

placed in trust upon his appointment. As a competitor, Canham was a national high jump champion and captain of the UM track team. As a coach, Canham's UM track teams won 12 Big 10 titles.

Following the speech, local service club honored local state championship high school teams from the Birmingham-Bloomfield area. Those schools and teams receiving awards were: Laker's soccer team, Rice's football and golf teams and Detroit Country Day's wrestling and golf teams.
