Vets office at college

Schoolcraft College's office of veterans affairs has services and information which can save a veteran a trip downtown.

That's the word from coordinator John Borenski, who adds: "In addition to answering questions and processing paperwork required for educational assistance under the GI Bill, our office has other information on all VA-related topics."

The office is located in room 500 of the Forum on the main campus at 1800 Haggerty, Livonia.

"OUR SERVICES are designed to assist Schoolcraft students, but they are also available to all veterans and their families within the college community," Borenski said.

"We have a good referral system and the capability to handle veterans-related problems and concerns."

His office works with administrators of CETA (Comprehensive Employment Training Act), unemployment offices and neighborhood services departments providing a referral service. Information and directions which many veterans believe are available only at the downtown VA Building are obtainable through the Schoolcraft veterans office.

The office also assists with admission and registration procedures and with applications for VA educational benefits.

BORENSKI is a Vietnam war veteran. He holds an associate degree from Schoolcraft.

He is an active member of both the National Association of Veterans Program Administrators and Michigan Association of Concerned Veterans. These groups provide information on new and pending legislation affecting veterans and act as lobbyists.
