## lose vote spurns bid for youth crime squad

The Oakland County Board of Cormissioners last week killed a proposal which sheriffs department officials said would help reduce juvenile crime in the county.

The proposal was to set up a four-person juvenile unit in the sheriff's department to deal specifically with cases of juvenile crime. This type of crime, sheriff's department officials maintain, continues to increase in Oakland County while other types are deellining.

declining.
Prior to the vote, the proposed program was blasted by County Executive Daniel T. Murphy. "You've got stop taking federal money. Apple pie and motherhood are great, but they also cost money." Murphy said.
"You've got to stop it. One day you're going to find yourself with more programs than you can afford," he predicted.

The program would have been funded primarily by the federal government. The county's contribution would been approximately \$5,000. The proposal failed [243. Commissioners voling against the proposed juvenile until included: Lillian Moffitt (R-Bloomfield Township), halph Modely (R-Birmingham), John Peterson (R-Rochester), Robert W. Page (R-Birmingham) and Joseph Montante (R-Orchard Lake).

Voling for the program were: Henry
W. Hoot (R-Troy), Robert McConnell
(R-Farmington Hills) and Lawrence
Pernick (D-Southfield).
Commissioners John McDonald (R-Farmington) and Alexander Perinolf
were not in the room for the vote.

THE NEW UNIT would have mean a more coordinated, professional attack on juvenile crime, said Lt. Ger-ald Reeves of the sheriff's department. He said officers assigned to the unit woust be better able to handle the juvenile cases which he said are now handled by road patrol officers. He added that the special unit would also leave road patrol officers free to concentrate on other types of crime. Some commissioners, however, were influenced-by the county executive's reasoning.

police chief and former superintendent of the Oakland Police Academy, sided with the executive. "I'm torn between law enforcement and the facts of life. We're just going to have to start holding to the budget more closely." he

"We must do some work with our youth if we want to keep a lid on erime." said Commissioner Robert Gorsline (R-Milford). "Crime is a fundamental issue," he said. "We must control this single most important increase in crime."

The county executive, however, produced a recent Market Opinion research survey taken in Oakland

County which indicated that crime is not a "fundamental issue" with most Oakland County residents. Instead, he said, most county residents want better transportation. Another commissioner, Patrick Daly (b-Portiac) countered, "If we only save one youth from Childrens Village, we'll have gotten back our money."

## Johnson wins at OCC

Mrs. Johnson, a 14-year veteran of
the multi-campus college's board, has
apparently outpolled another
incumbent, Dennis Rogers of Troy, for

announced, political newcomer Sandra
Ritter of Waterford Township topped
the eight-candidate field. The second
board position was still undecided,
though, as Rogers led Mrs. Johnson, 10,185 to 10,183.
Earlier this week, the Oakland
County Board of Canvassers released
the official election figures.
Mrs. Dobron pulled shead of Rogers
with 10,178 votes to Rogers' 10,145.
Rogers said he has not decided if he
will ask for a recount.
"It could cost 2,000. It imight cost as
much as \$7,000 or \$8,000. It's a pretty
weighty decision, Obviously, 'I'm disappointed,'' he said.
For Rogers, it was his second





Oakland Community College (OCC) will be closed July 3 and 4. The summer term had been sched-


uled to begin July 3.
