

NFWB baseball leagues crown 1st half champs

The North Farmington/West Bloomfield Pony American League first half championship was captured by the Athletics last week, despite their first loss of the year.

The Royals handed the Athletics their only loss this season, as they

nipped the champs, 4-3. Mike Orsini had a pair of triples to key the victory for the Royals.

The Athletics showed their true form as they walloped the Twins, 17-5. Dave Butler, Murray Brown, and Bret Bauman each had three hits for the victors, while Richard Yoo hit a grand slam for the Twins.

Cagers enroll

Two All-Oakland County cagers, Dave Milburn of Farmdale and Darryl Clausell of Southfield, have announced their intentions to attend Oakland Community College this fall.

Milburn, a 6'6" forward, averaged 10 points, 15 rebounds and seven blocked shots a game in his senior year at Farmdale High School.

Clausell played for Don Kaump's Southfield Blue Jays. A 6'2" guard, he averaged 16.2 points a game while leading the team to a Southern Michigan Association championship.

The pair will join returning lettermen Ossie Cobb and Johnnie Keel, who helped lead the Raiders to an Eastern Conference Championship last season with an 8-2 record.

In the NFWB Pony National League, the Expos continued to dominate as they pounded the Pirates, 15-1. Dave Sklar smacked a pair of homers, Chip Greer hit one, and Jerry Leber went for 4 at the plate in helping the Expos to the victory.

In other NFWB baseball action, the Tigers and the Angels tied for first half championship of the NFWB American T-Ball League and will have a playoff to determine the first-half champ. In their only meeting this season, the Angels won by a single run. Danny Stars, Scott Cole, and Josh Hoffman were instrumental in that Angel victory, while Gerry Haight, Ron Kuipersmith, and Bob Mitchell played well for the Tigers.

The Giants won the first half cham-

ionship in the NFWB National T-Ball League with a 7-0 record. Eric Chekal, Howard Rankin, and Mark Shestiek were keys in the championship drive.

After two games in the second half of the National T-Ball League season, the Cards and the Cubs are tied for the lead at 2-0. Doug Fitzner, Kenny Herman, Rick Patterson, Shawn Sarkisian, and Tom Koss were hitting

heroes in the Cubs win over the Braves, and in their 28-18 victory over the Pirates, Patterson had three home runs and Fitzner two homers and two triples.

Andy Fretz and Doug Crall helped the Cards beat the Dodgers in their first game of the second half, while Rick Broida, Matt Fahrenkrug and Jeff Unruh were the hitting stars in

the Cards 9-6 win over the Reds.

At the end of the first half of the NFWB American Minor League, both the Royals and the Tigers were tied with 6-1 records in a playoff game held on June 19th, the Tigers came out on top with a 5-2 victory, capturing the first-half championship.

In the NFWB Federal Minors, the Expos emerged as first-half champs with a perfect 7-0 record. In their final 28-7 win over the Orioles, Donn St. Pierre went 4 for 4 at the plate, including three doubles. Chris Naumoff and Keith Elkin also contributed two hits each to the cause. David Levine had two hits for the Orioles.

The Phillies and the Pirates both remained undefeated in NFWB

National Minor League play, as the Phillies beat the Dodgers, 12-2, and the Pirates defeated the Cards, 6-0. Paul Warman, Mickey Redding, and Gary Schwedt had the hot bats for the Phillies, while Rick Schneider, John Bush, and Chris Roberts were vital in the Pirate win. Both teams are now 3-0.

The Cubs picked up in the second half of the NFWB National Major League season where they left off as they defeated the Phillies, 2-1, in seven innings. Jeff Paesot pitched a strong six innings, but it was Steve Zang who got the win as he pitched a scoreless seventh and then drove in the winning run with his third hit of the night.

Prep football in Silverdome

The Pontiac School District Athletic Department has announced the signing of an agreement to hold its second annual high school football double-header at the Pontiac Silverdome on Sept. 9.

Pontiac Central will play Flint Southwestern in the first game of the double-header, followed by Pontiac Northern against North Farmington. Flint Southwestern was undefeated in regular season play last year, losing in the semifinals of the state tournament. North Farmington lost one game last season, while Pontiac Central was 7-2

and Pontiac Northern posted a 5-4 record.

Other highlights will include the Pontiac Central Marching Band, the Pontiac Northern Marching Band, the Flint Southwestern High School Band, the North Farmington Band and the Pontiac Schools Junior High Camp Band.

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS SPECIAL MEETING
May 19, 1978

The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills met in Special Session in City Hall on May 19, 1978. Mayor Dolan convened the meeting at 7:30 P.M. Members present were: Alkateeb, Deacon, Jones, Oppenhausser, Smith and Soronen. Others present were: City Manager Majors, City Clerk Cairns, City Attorney Bibeau and Planning Consultant Coates.

Mayor Dolan read the following proclamations:

- congratulating Laura Pappas for her selection as "Michigan White Queen";
- designating May 20th through 27th as "Senior Citizen Week."

Public Hearing was held regarding proposal to use 1978-79 Federal Revenue Sharing Funds for Construction Fund reimbursement in amount of \$100,000 and to pay off debt service on Bond issues for the Coy Drain in the amount of \$80,000 and golf course in the amount of \$70,000.

After Public Hearing, Amending Ordinance No. C82-145, a request to rezone property located on 8 Mile Road between Gill and Drake Roads from Single Family use (R-1) to Multiple Family Residential use (R-2) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, introduction of Amending Ordinance No. C82-146, a request to rezone approximately 81 acres located at 29050 Haggerty Road, between 12 and 13 Mile Roads from Single Family use (R-1) to Planned Residential use (RP-1) was denied.

After Public Hearing, Amending Ordinance No. C82-147, a request to rezone approximately 32 acres located on the north side of Grand River between Drake and Gill Roads from Light Industrial use (LI-1) to General Business District use (B-3) was introduced by a vote of 5-2. Mr. Deacon and Mrs. Soronen opposed.

After Public Hearing, Amending Ordinance No. C82-148, a request to rezone approximately 17.5 acres on the south side of 12 Mile just west of Farmington Road from Single Family use (R-1) to Office Service use (OS-1A) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, Amending Ordinance No. C82-149, a request to rezone approximately 18 acres located directly west of I-96 and south of Grand River and 15 Mile Roads from Light Industrial use (LI-1) to General Business District use (B-3) was unanimously introduced.

After Public Hearing, request to vacate an alley adjacent to the Michigan National Bank located on the south side of Nine Mile Road, west of Farmington Road was approved by a vote of 5-1. Mr. Deacon opposed.

Special Assessment District established and City Clerk was authorized to receive cost estimates regarding sanitary sewer improvement along Edgell Hill Street, west of Middlebelt Road.

Low bid by Bob Ford, Inc. in the amount of \$58,021.37 for the purchase of eleven cars for the Police Department was unanimously accepted.

Quarterly transfer of Major Road Funds to Local Road Funds in amount of \$65,413.58 was unanimously approved.

Use of White Motor Co. service drive by Star Cutter Company unanimously approved.

Council granted a sign variance to Randall Sign Company to install a sign at the Standard Service Station, 2249 Farmington Road.

Council granted permission to close Power Road from Grand River to Nine Mile Road on June 25th for a Block Party.

City Mgr. Deadman reported on the progress of The Old Winery, Inc. City Council from Southfield and Northville regarding HB 4608 were received and filed.

Resolution from the City of Berkeley regarding opposition to taxpayers subsidy of the Pontiac Silverdome was received and filed.

Council supported the State establishing a Uniform Statute for local government to control pornography while opposing SB 1422.

Letter from Mr. Robert F. Yark regarding heavy traffic on Valley View Drive and Prospect was received and filed.

Council granted a fence variance to Mr. Robert Burton, 21165 Larkspur.

The following resolutions were adopted:

- Supporting the continuation of the existing CETA Program without any major amendment
- Authorizing a temporary transfer of funds from the General Fund to the Building Authority
- Authorizing payment of \$20,517.00 to K. Pemberton Company
- Authorizing payment of \$3,265.00 to Viking Demolition Co.
- Authorizing payment of \$4,194.90 to Best Asphalt
- Authorizing increase in Sewer Rates to Oakland County
- Authorizing Amendment to Agreement between City Manager and City.

Ordinance No. C431-78 - Traffic Control Order for Thomas Street from Warner to School Street.

The Financial Report for the General Fund 11 Months ended May 31, 1978 was received and filed.

Monthly bills were approved for payment.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:50 P.M.
