

Michigan artists caucus organized

A Michigan Artist's Caucus (MAC) has been formed as a result of the first Michigan Congress on the Arts held recently in Detroit.

The caucus intends to establish a statewide artists communication network and to assist in solving problems facing Michigan artists.

Some proposed projects of the MAC include: creation of a statewide artist mailing list; development of an umbrella service organization to deal with artists' needs; development of artist representation on state and federal agencies and at the White House Conference on the Arts; creation of an active lobby for concerns affecting Michigan artists; develop methods of implementing the First Michigan Congress on the Arts resolutions and to increase public visibility of Michigan artists' works.

An "Arts in Education" project will make available 500 artist-in-school visits by MAC members. The project represents \$50,000 in donated time by artists involved in MAC.

The caucus also intends to secure additional workshop facility space with the cooperation of Michigan colleges and universities. Regional discussions will be scheduled to discuss additional concerns of state artists.

Griffin ignores challenger's charges

David and Goliath have a better chance of getting together for a rematch.

Oakland County Prosecutor L. Brooks Patterson, who is seeking the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate, has repeatedly tried to draw U.S. Sen. Robert Griffin (R-Traverse City) into the open for a public debate.

Last week, he tried again and failed.

Patterson went one step further, though. Instead of calling on Griffin just to agree to debate, he arranged for at least three appearances in

Holland, Grand Rapids and Muskegon where Griffin can meet for a showdown on "the issues." Griffin, however, will have no part of it.

"It's just another political stunt by a candidate to attract attention," Griffin responded, refusing to even refer to Patterson by name. He said he would only debate the Democratic nominee in the fall. He added that any debating in the primary campaign would be "divisive" to the Republican Party.

THE PUBLIC doesn't know where he stands on the issues," Patterson charged. "He's deliberately withholding his position on critical issues."
