

Professional team cultivates suburban soccer fan support

It's no secret the Detroit Express are counting on suburbia for sustenance. And, lately, the relationship has been growing

The Express, streaking through its first season in the North American Socoer League (NASL, played before its second largest crowd (15,018) last weekend against the Caribous of Colorado. That's the biggest crowd since opening day at the Silverdome when the learn drew 28,323.

In 12 home games, the Express have drawn an average of 11.07. In its just three Silverdome mathres—all victories—Detroit has played to at least 10,000 persons.

TROY'S YOUTH Soccer League was formed in 1973 with seven team and 125 players. The TYSL spring season ended two weeks ago with 75 teams and more than 1,200 players participating. League president George Popa anticipates the league expanding to at least 2,000 players next year.

Scorer ends struggle

Trevor Francis is not only a goal-scoring whiz for the Detroit Express, but also somewhat of a psychological magician.

The Express, which had been struggling offensively until Francis' arrival from Birmingham City (England) in late May, has recently been one of the hottest scoring teams in the North American Soccer League (NASL).

In the past four games—excluding the two most recent matches against Vancouver and Minesola—the Express has scored it goals for a four-goal-per-game average. Its most lopsided victory in that span—and for the season—was a 3-0 pasting of the Caribous of Colorado last weekend.

Francis was the biggest threat in those four games with four goals and one assist, In 10 games played, the English superstar has scored seven gaals and assisted on five others.

However, as far as his teammates are consented, his value extends beyond shooting and passing. Francis has given the team a needed fiftensive confidence it so desporately lacked at the start of the season.

"The main problem is the player that marks (guards) me, "said Francis. "They usually ask for my shirt after the game."

FRANCIS IS perhaps one of the most carefully guarded players in the NASL: And rightly so. He came into the league widely known, and opposing teams will always have their best defender guard him.

I just wish the defenders would quit kicking me." said Francis of his being closely marked. "Soccer is a game of skill, the fans come to see skills, not players kicking each other." Hopefully. Detroit will have Francis back for another season of soccer. He like playing with his teammates and his ocidal life here so far.
