A typical camp day begins with the campers doing stretching, flexibility and running drills.

Next comes agility drills with all players passing through a series of stations, each with a different agility

Players can be found jumping rope and working on defensive footwork in the agility routine.

The campers are then drilled on the fundamentals of basketball such as

tundamentals of basketball such as shooting the jumper, ballhandling, passing, rebounding, team defense and offense.

Campers are also treated to instruc-tional movies and guest tectures.

On Thursday, Boston Celtic guard and former Piston great Dave Bing talked on the finer points of individual moves.

Among the teachers included is Class D state champion basketball coach Bob Shoemaker of Orchard Lake St. Mary's. Probably the most stirring lectures are orated by none other than Vitale, the non-stop motivator.

"What ever career you decide to choose," said Vitale, "give it your choose," said Vitale best—a 120 per cent."

"You should be able to look at your-self each day in the mirror asking yourself: Have I given an honest effort?," said Vitale in a sample of his lecture to the campers.
