

Five Farmington area residents were among 19 winners in the fifth countywide creative writing contest spacesored by the Bogish department at the Orchard Ridge Cumpus of Oakland Community College in Farming College in the adult division, the College in the August College in Farmington Hills residents.

Unusual shifts, continual adaptation
to new machinery, and the postal

postal workers don't receive two consecutive days off in a week, he adds.

Postal workers, he maintains, are required to lift 70 hs., like it on their shoulders, and carry it as a basic requirement for the job. While the public sees the employee behind the public sees the employee behind the desk handing out stamps, it forgets about all the sorting, loading, unload-atout all the sorting, loading, unload-ing, and heavy work carried out by

postal clerks.

Citing a study by the postal service itself, Brown points to a 5.2 per cent increase in productivity for postal workers, while private industry scored a 2.6 per cent increase.

About 70,000 postal employees nationwide have been eliminated through attrition and retirement in the barganing units since the last contract. With an increase in mail, those statistics show that postal employees are doing more work, he adds. Oversupervision, rather than slackness on the part of barganing unit members, is the service's problem, Brown says. Of the 142 employees at the Farmington offlice, 12 — or one for every 10 owners—I as supervisor, Brown says. Two of the nation's four postal-related unions are represented, including the National Arsociation of Letter Carriers.
