Building dips in Southfield

Building activity in Southfield the first half of 1978 is down from the same period last year.

In the first six months of this year. 251 building starts were estimated at a cost of \$22.4 million, according to Southfield Department of Building and Safety Engineering. Statistic from January through June, 1977, indicate 278 building permits issued at an estimated value of \$85.3 million.
