One of the most terrifying experiences parents can have is watching their child have a seizure. The younger the child and the more rapidly the temperature shoots up, the greater the chance of a seizure.

While this may be caused by fever above, it is essential to rule out other causes, especially the first time it happens. The child must be evaluated by a physician. Despite their frightening appearance, convulsions are generally harmless. When properly controlled, they do not lead to brain damage or other permanent side effects. Usually the seizures are brief, lasting only a few min-

Be sure the airway is clear. A blocked windpipe is a danger during a seizure. Turn the child on his or her side or stomach to prevent swallowing the tongue. If the child's color is fine. But do not try to force aspirin into a convulsing child. In some families there is a history of fever convulsions. Some children have recurrent siezures when they get high fevers. In such cases, many physicians recommend long-term preventative use of a barbiturate until the problem to utgrown. usually within a few years.
