Oakland Community College's (OCC) pres-idential search committee Thursday will recommend four persons to become the school's next president.

According to sources and facts made public at a recent board of trustees study session, the four persons are:

According to OCC spokemen, none of the four candidates will attend Thursday night's meeting at the college's central offices in Bloomfield Hills.

The presidential search committee's list does not include the name of the acting president and vice-president for academic affairs. Derek Numey, Numey has said privately he was interested in the job but would not apply for the position, Numey was unavailable for comment.
