

# In The Pocket

What is believed to be a record for summer bowling in the Detroit area was rolled last week at Westland Bowl when five members of the Trio League broke the 700 barrier in a little more than two hours.

Long noted for high scoring, the trio circuit outdid itself when Bob Shonice turned in a 719 and Bob Rose followed with a 712. Not far behind the two leaders came Rick Capaldi with 708, Bob Sokol with 703 and John Wodarski with 702.

In the midst of the heavy firing, Sokol missed a perfect game when the No. 6 pin wobbled but wouldn't fall on his final ball and he had to settle for a 299.

To earn the pace-making role, Shonice opened with a 247, followed with 223 and closed with a 249. Rose earned the runner-up spot because of a 276 middle game in his 712. Wodarski made the select group by posting a final game of 269 in his 702.

On the women's side, Monica Dlugos showed the way with a 577 that included games of 204 and 213.

ALL RECORDS for membership were broken in both the Greater Detroit Bowling Association and the Detroit

Woman's Bowling Association in the bowling year that closed July 31. The men's membership reached the peak of 149,482, with competition in 3,544 leagues. This is an increase of more than 7,000 members.

On the women's side, the new high mark is 127,617 members in 3,462 winter leagues and 349 summer leagues. This also is a great jump over last year.

On the individual side during the year there were 52 perfect games compared to 36 a year ago and the season high series of 815 was shared by Chuck Stuerer and Harry Campbell.

The women had only one perfect game and that was the 300 rolled by Jerry Ritter on the opening day of the women's state tournament at Kalamazoo. Jerry also had the high series of 742 bowled in a league session last November.

Trailing her in individual honors were Jan Pavella with a 299 and Marilyn Leedon, who fired a 298 at Wonderland.

AT WOODLAND LANES the girls had another great week. When the firing stopped, Carol Rexen was in front. With a 144 average, she posted games of 156, 193 and 184 for a 533.

One of her closest rivals was Dena Meyers, a 131-average bowler, who put together games of 160, 169 and 153 for 482. Others who did well included Lou Buoncomagno, who carried a mere 85 average. She

started with a 132, followed with 151 and closed with 128 for a 411.

Another surprise came when Cindy Meyers, with a 136 average, found the range for a 514 series that included a 231 game.

Beth Reid, with a 94 average, fashioned a 406, while Valda Oliver rolled games of 143, 155 and 133 for 431 to boost her 118 average. Rita Elczak went way over her 102 average with games of 194, 113 and 135 for a 412.

Away from the low handicap leagues, John Sonja, with a 158 average, went on a scoring spree. He started with a 245, followed with 212 and closed with a 192 for 649.

## Tennis tips on lessons, pros

What's a good way to meet people, get some exercise and learn the difference between a western forehand and an all-purpose continental grip? The answer is easy. Approximately 150 teaching professionals in the metropolitan area would say, "Take lessons from me."

Some students follow the school of thought that it is best to familiarize themselves with the game before deciding on lessons.

The most prevailing logic among the pros is that that route is a good way to learn some bad habits. In most cases, it's going to take more lessons to change a bad habit than it is to learn the right way in the first place.

Let's assume you've decided that it's time to take tennis lessons. Two questions immediately arise: From whom? Group or private instruction?

Possibly one of the best means for selecting a pro would be through the recommendation of a friend. With unsatisfactory instruction, you are not just wasting your time and money, but learning the wrong methods.

A good idea, in addition to a recommendation, is to look for a pro who is certified by the United States Professional Tennis Association. This insures a pro's sincerity about his work.

Whether you choose to become part of a group lesson or take individual instruction from a pro probably depends on your motivation.

Group lessons are a more economical way to learn the game and a good way to meet future playing partners.

Eventually, the more serious and affluent player will want to go for individual instruction. Also, private lessons are about the only way for the advanced player to correct bad habits.

Whether group or private, students should make sure they don't pick up a racket just on lesson days.

Many pros advocate two to four hours on the court practicing a new stroke or method for every hour in class. The only way to learn is to groove the stroke through repetition.

Most important for the professional as well as the player is to keep it simple.

The mind can only handle so many details at one time. It is better to concentrate on one or two things during a lesson and to develop them well. Many pros are guilty at times of overreach.

There is no hard and fast rule as to how many lessons to take to become a competent player. That will depend on one's condition, agility and motivation.

I would say it is best to take lessons until you feel comfortable with your game.

Tennis isn't an expensive game to learn. Lessons are offered through local recreation departments and schools during the summer months for as low as \$1 per group hour.

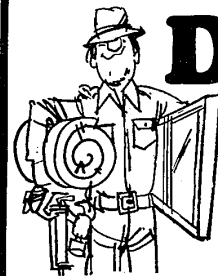
Our area is blessed with four indoor and one indoor-outdoor commercial tennis houses that offer professional instruction year-around.
