Palera decided to keep starter Jim Zorn, backup man Steve Meyers and Sam Atkins—all three of whom finished last year with escahawks. "Patera sat down with me and told me why I was being cut," said Palmer. "He told me the three veterans knew the system and the timing of bringing in someone new was not right.
"A lot of my questions were never answered," he added, "I thought I did very well while I was there.
"My throwing was better than ever.

"WHEN I GOT there and started practicing," Palmer said, "I felt I had a good chance of making it."

Palmer said all the quarterbacks, including the three veterans, were charted each day statistically on their performances.

"They looked over films and rated everybody," he added, and I was right up there with the rest.

"Some days I did a lot of standing around while the veterans went through the motions," said Palmer.
"I was very discouraged but I also learned a lot things. It was an experience I'll really remember," he said. As opposed to the Detroit Lions, who started full contact workouts the very first day, the Seahawks chose a different avenue.
