Commission oversees civil rights

So you think your right to equal enjoyment and protection of civil rights has been violated?

You're infuriated because you may have been discriminated against.

What do you do? Where do you turn for information and help?

The Michigan Civil Rights Commission may be the solution to your problem.

The commission was established in 1963 to insure that all individuals have the opportunity to obtain employment, housing and other real estate, the full and equal utilization of public accommodations, public service and educational facilities without discrimination because of race, religion, color, national origin, sex, age, marital status, height, weight, arrest record or handicap.

If a complaint is deemed valid by the commission, it will investigate the

alleged discriminatory practice, policy or custom. If the commission determines that the Michigan Civil Rights Act has been violated, it will take whatever action it deems necessary to abolish the discriminatory practices.

Anyone with a discrimination complaint should contact the Civil Rights Commission's office in Pontiac.

IF THE AGENCY deems the complaint valid, the claimant files a formal complaint and the case is assigned to a field representative.

About a third of the complaints are dismissed because they are not valid, says Phyllis McKesson, director of the public affairs division of the Civil Rights Commission.

The case undergoes continual evaluation and analysis by a hierarchy of officials. Commission officials attempt to reach a settlement agreeable to

both parties without taking the case into public hearing.

If the case reaches the attorney general's office and has not yet been resolved, it undergoes final analysis. If the office considers it a legitimate complaint, a charge is issued.

Both parties then testify. If the commission determines that the respondent has violated the Civil Rights Act, it will issue a final order requiring the respondent to cease the discriminatory practice and will take any other action it deems necessary to correct the situation.

Only about one per cent of the cases

brought to the commission actually reach the public hearing stage, McKesson says. Most are settled out of court.

A person alleging a violation of the Civil Rights Act may bring a civil action, seeking an injunction to stop the practice or damages, or both.

The commission urges anyone who believes they have been the subject of discrimination to contact the agency, even if the case seems minor. After all, the small cases are the basis for the major ones.
