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# Apartment Pacing Housing

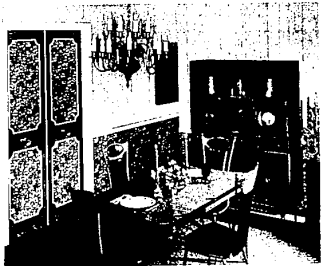
While home prices are coming down from their Everest, new home building seems to be continuing upward in the six-county Detroit metropolitan region.

Apartment, which account for more than half of the new construction reported in the first six months of 1969, exceeded or neared the total pace in four of eight Observerland

communities, but single-family housing slowed in much of the metropolitan area.

with 295, Westland with 235 and Plymouth Township with 115.

but the reverse was true in Farmington Township (120-180) and Westland (108-129). Garden City had no new multiple, Farmington City 12 and Plymouth City two. Discrepancies between total unit gains and the breakdowns of multiple and single homes are accounted for by "remodelings."

## Candlelight Dining Back In Vogue

Make no mistake about it, elegant dining is back in style. That's the word from home improvement consultant John Concord who notes that young America's penchant for imitating the past does not stop at clothing fashions and hair styles inspired by the 19th Century.

"Ironically, for years Americans have gained more and more leisure time, but spent less of it in pursuit of leisurely activities. Today, we see this trend reversing," Concord believes.

"It's not surprising that many today want to put on the brakes and recapture a whole life style that was less hurried. Leisurely dining by candlelight, with all of the trappings, was part of that style, and it's very defini-

tely back in vogue."

FOR EXAMPLE, Concord points to studies which indicate that the American homemaker is rediscovering the dining area. The trend is to set the room apart and give it a distinction of its own.

One way this is being accomplished is by use of wainscot and woodgrained panels on accent walls and partitions.

A new Marbletone panel which captures the look and feel of the real McCoy, also has been a popular mood setter for the dining area, Concord says.

The popularity of these panels can be traced to the fact that they are easily installed over existing walls by amateur or professional using ordinary carpenter tools.

Altogether, in the six counties, 15,273 units of all types were authorized by local government building permits, an increase of 15.4 per cent over the same period in 1968.

Wayne and Oakland Counties, in which Observerland communities lie, registered considerably less than this average, however.

OAKLAND WAS lowest with 7.7 per cent more than last year, and Wayne registered a 9.9 per cent increase. Monroe County was highest with a 36 per cent jump.

Multiple housing increased and single family permits declined overall, according to the reporting planning division of the Southeastern Michigan Council of Governments (SEM-COG).

Multiples accounted for more than 56 per cent of the total with 8,640 units, an increase of 3,024, Single family permits declined to 6,643 from 7,563 in the previous year -- a new low for this period.

LIVONIA INCREASED in total units to 524, a 160-unit increase over 1968, to remain in the top 10 of major growth communities.

Westland fell away from the leaders for the first time in two years, registering less than 223 new units -- compared to 801 in 1968 and 666 in 1967.

Westland's 605 multiple dwelling units authorized during the first six months of last year were anywhere near matched this year, falling below the 263 reported by the 10th highest community reported.

Livonia led Observerland communities in authorized unit gains with a total of 513, followed by Farmington Township

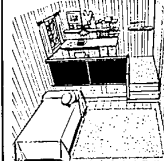

### **Platform Style Study**

BY ELEVATING a bedroom study area 18 inches above the floor, you immediately create a private lounge spot that has allure. It's something like an inlaid tree house, giving the boy or girl a sense of security and incentive to study.

As illustrated, the platform



has storage underneath. A cantilevered working surface of tempered hardboard may be used instead of buying a desk. Use metal or fiberboard filing cabinets, hold study supplies and folders.

For an attractive wall, use one of the Royalecote wood-grained or textured panels made by Allied for Corporation. Brackets and shelves provide convenient storage for books, supplies and art projects. Sliding doors matching the background wall can be made by cutting pre-drilled hardboard panels of the same wood-grain and putting them in metal tracks.
