

How To Protest That Protest

Heistfully but spiritedly, the people who are opposed to today's Vietnam war moratorium are making their own demonstration of support for President Nixon.

They are protesting the protest in a number of ways, but these prelude:

- Conduct business as usual—go to work, go to school, don't patronize the protesters.
- Turn on your lights—auto headlights, porch lights, office lights—leave them on during the protest.
- Fly the American flag (this suggestion from Livonia Mayor Harvey Moelke). The red, white and blue will contrast sharply with the official black of the moratorium.

Funds Set Up Grant

What do you do if you're an organization that has lost much of its membership and much of its purpose to other groups?

If you are the 63-year-old Michigan Schoolmasters' Club you vote yourself out of existence and use the club's funds to set up a scholarship which perpetuates the group's name and original purpose.

The Schoolmasters' Club was organized at The University of Michigan in 1886 to establish three communication between high school and college teachers.

The club voted to disband itself in May and authorized its executive committee to transfer its treasury to U-M's Regents. The result is the Michigan Schoolmasters' Club Scholarship Fund.

The \$16,700 fund will award its first annual scholarship in April 1970.

The grant of \$700 to \$800 will be available to any teacher in a Michigan school who holds at least a "bachelor's" degree, who has committed himself to career in teaching, and who intends to earn an advanced degree at U-M.
