Both Sides Saw Threat

The Why' Behind Weekend Petition Drives

Who started the race to the courthouse? Which side circulated the first petition? At this point, there is only a cloud of runors which circulated wildly last Thursday and Friday and claims and counter-claims.

And there are two petitions filed, one for an an-nexation election and the other for an incorporation vote

INCORPORATION leaders in the township say they simply reacted to rumors that city residents were preparing annexation petitions for filing in case consolidation fails. Annexation leaders in the city say they had done

nothing until reports were confirmed that incorpora-tion petitions were being circulated.

It is not known who jumped the gun -- only that each side felt the other made the first move. The incorporators say they reacted to the annexers, and the annexers claim the oppos-

More important than who jumped the gun is why the triggers were pulled.

LEADERS OF the incorporation drive of town-ship residents were Robert McConnell. Bill Maple. Emanuel Maisel, Bill Hultz and Arnold Michlin. A spokesman for the incorporators report peti-tions were taken out after rumors were heard that city residents were making preparations to file an-nexation petitions in case consolidation failed.

Leaders of the incorporation drive are in favor of consolidation but were fearful of annex-ation moves if consolidation is defeated.

The incorporation petition was filed to freeze the township's boundaries to allow residents a chance to decide their future.

The filing was explained as strictly a defensive move to stave off any possible annexation in case consolidation proceedings end.

DICK TUPPER, who filed the annexation peti-tions, said he acted only after confirming the incor-poration petitions were being circulated.

"I did not have any plans to circulate annexa-tion petitions until the incorporation petitions were already in circulation." Tupper explained. He said he did not pick up the petitions until Friday night and circulation petitions had been circulated as early as Thureday.

circulation petitions has seen. Thursday. Tupper said he heard reports the incorpora-tion petitions were picked up as late as two weeks ago. He said the annexation more was started for "self-preservation" of the City of Farmington.

Termington. The proposed incorporation. Tupper said, would see the city surrounded on all sides by another city. Reasons behind the annexation request. Tupper said, were to expand the city's tax base and prevent the city from becoming land-locked. "Our tax base is not stable." Tupper said, "and at present the city has no control over the Grand River corridor. We are trying to improve the image visitors have of Farmington as they enter on Grand River. Improvement of the image on Grand River is vital to the downtown area. Tupper stressed he is still in favor of con-solidation "all the way." He said his action should in no way cloud the consolidation ques-tion because it was only a defensive move to keep the city from being land-locked by incorpo-ration of the township.

"Consolidation is the answer to our boundary problems." Tupper said. "Hopefully, a 'yes' vote will be achieved Nov. 4 and neither annexation nor incorporation will have to be considered." problem
