Former governor's home embodies Bachelor adds tub pioneer spirit, gracious hospitality

There was no governor's mansion in Lansing, back in 1859 when Moses Wis-ner was elected to Michigan's highest office.

office.

So Pine Grove, Wisner's Pontiac home, became the governor's office, as well as official residence.

An unusual blend of working farm and gracious official residence, Pine Grove'r iemains today as testimony of the quickly-changing face of Michigan in the Civil War era.


From his original purchase of 28 acres and a small building, Moses Wisner expanded his property to 160 acres of farm land, orchards and pine

of farm land, orchards and pine groves.

He built a large Greek Revival home, greenhouse, barn and carriage house, and continued additions to the house until his term as governor and the Civil War intervened.

The summer kitchen, complete with butter churn, rug-beater, old-fashioned poporom popper, crockery jars, castinua cookware and flattrons, evokes images of good farm cooking produced by hard work and primitive methods. Hanging along the walls are bunches of dried herts, collected from the herb gardan in back. The garden is tended these days by members of the Oakland Counly Pioner and Historical Society. The society also maintains the Wisner home and conducts tours of house and grounds Thesday-Saturday, 1-4 p.m.

THE ONE-ROOM schoolhouse, moved to the property 13 years ago, recalls the days when the 'three Re' were taught to the tune of the hickory stick. The severity of rows of wooden desks and bare floors is somewhat softened by the collection of antique dolls boused in the rear of the school-room and the quilling frame set up in the corner by the quilting guild. The quilters plan to move operations into the carriage house when the rebuilding is completed.



The Wisner's summer kitchen, bare-scrubbed and airy, contains many cooking utensils and household tools of the Civil War era, used by the farm wife in preparing meals and cleaning house.

Little touches, like a delicate white cotton nightgown faid out on the bed. a half-packed suitcase on the floor, papers and small books strewn across the desk, and a small evening bag and shawl dropped on the sofa, dispel the sterile atmosphere that

so often haunts museum homes and gives the Wisner house a lived-in feeting.

lived by the close part of the house, its lower level, houses the offices and library of the historical society. The research library contains histories, manuscripts and other information about Oakland Country's past. The library is open to researchers by appointment.

Guides conduct leisurely tours of the house and grounds and extend the hospitality that has endured since the mansion received the governor's guests more than a century ago.
