# Lutherans open high school

The Lutheran High School Association will open a secondary school in Farmington Hills in September, despite a failure to lease vacant school property from the Farmington school board.

oespite a tailure to lease vacant school property from the Farmington school baard. The new school will be housed in the education wing of Prince of Peace parish at Twelve Mile and Farmington Road. Clayton Husnage! will serve as principal. Six rooms will be included in the high school.

The association recently approached the school board in an effort to lease the Bond School at Thirteen Mile and Orchard Lake Road, a building currently used for storage and targeted for sale by the district.

The board refused the offer, although it has not yet taken a formal

position on leasing or selling of vacant school buildings to potential schools, according to Supt. Lewis Schulman.

"But there still is a possibility that there will be growth in that area, and we may need it," he said. Another pos-sibility is competition. School board members acknowledge that other schools in the area could cut into the district's enrollment figures, upon which state funding is based.

"There's got to be some real con-cern about competition in this area," Schulman said.

THE NEW Lutheran high school has an enrollment of 60 students thus far, according to Husnagel. Now it is accepting applications from outside the Lutheran Church. The school will stress academics, he

said, with more emphasis placed on grammar and composition than liter-ature in English courses. Mathemat-ics, including algebra and geometry, foreign language (German), social studies, science, religion, typing-short-hand, art and band-choir also will be offered.

Teachers have been commissioned from as far away as Sm Diego, Ohio and Illinois, Husnagel added, as well as throughout Michigan.
Sudents will be offered a "full range" of athletic activities, he explained. Boys will have a choice between soccer, crosscouthry, baskeball, baseball and track, while girls

can choose from cross-country, bas-ketball, volleyball, softball and track. Extra-curricular activites haven't been finalized, but the high school will have a band and choir, a newspaper and a yearbook, he added. Clubs will develop as students show an interest in various activities.

Tuition for each child coming from a Lutheran church which is a member of the high school association will be \$700 per year. Those students not affiliated with such a parish will pay \$1,400 per

year.
The school has been certified by the Michigan Department of Education. For more information, call \$53-7155.
