DOUBLE-DIPPING—Failed, 32 for and 58 against, to table stricter limitations on "double-dpping"—the practice of military retirees taking civilian jobs in the federal government and thus getting dual U.S. paychecks. Failure of the tabling motion left intact a 471,500 ceiling proposed on the combined income of most military retirees who take civilian jobs with Uncle Sam. The ceiling is part of S 260, the Civil Service reform bill later passed (67-1a and sent to the flouse.

NEW SENATE BUILDING—Voted, 61 for and 11 against, to approve and send to the White House the conference report on a \$5.8 billion supplemental appropriations bill (IRI 19487). The bill originally contained \$54 million to advance construction of the third Senate office building—an edifice balleded a "palace" by its critica but defended as necessary office space by its supporters. With this vote, the Senate reluctantly went along with a House decision to delay any more funding for the controversial structure until after the 1978 congressional elections.

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
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
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
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
