Reading clinic aids college bound

A new local reading clinic located in the All for Learning children's store in West Bloomfield's Orchard Mall is geared to middle school, junior high and high school-aged students. Classes offered by Dr. Sanford Norman, reading consultant for Waterford Schools, will include content reading, speed reading and preparation for college entrance and other achievement tests.

Norman, who lives in Birmingham, is teaming up with All for Learning proprietor Jim Macy to offer the after-school clinics. Macy, former communications specialist for Birmingham Schools, left that post to open the educationally-oreinted toy, game and book store two years ago.

THE READING CLINIC is designed to give students the tools to get through their current classes, Norman says, such as science, math and social studies.

"We'll teach them to read for who, what, where, when and why," he says.
"The concept here is to get down to the student's level, find the gap and fill it in as soon as possible."

Norman says students at these older ages want an immediate reward, like passing biology, and are no longer impressed by parents pleadings about the correlation between education and getting a good job.



They know they can pull off a non-skilled job and perhaps make more than a college graduate, Norman explains. "They need an education to survive in society, not to get ahead

Norman says remedial reading may not be helpful for the older student and "has built up all kinds of hang-ups" for those who have to be specalily taken out of class. This instruction, said Norman. will be on a one-to-one basis and he is confident of getting results. He watted until he received his doctorate from Wayne Sate University (in April) before setting up the reading clinic. He said he wanted to provide "the highest professional level." "Al tot of parents don't shop clinics the way they should." he added.

ALSO ON TAP are speed reading and test-taking clinics. The speed reading is designed for ages junior-high through adult. Norman, who maintains he's the

nigh through adult.
Norman, who maintains he's the best reading consultant in the Waterford system, says he will concentrate on building rapid comprehension techniques, not on how fast the eye can be made to travel.

Norman defends his test-taking clin-ics against critics who contend they

will have little effect on college board scores.

"It depends on the individual student."

student. For students whose motivation and natural intelligence are high in themselves, such a course may not produce significant results, he says.

But for the student whose parents "have been on his fanny to study hard and get good grades" the class could be worthwhile. "That student may not actually have the skills to do well on a nation-wide exam. He can profit from nation-wide exam. He can profit from the course because he will be thor-oughly familiar with what's coming."

NORMAN ASSOCIATED himself with "All for Learning" through a cas-usal conversation with Macy, as Nor-man broused through the store.

"Everyone with a bent for education has a respect for this store," Norman says. "I am impressed with Jim's approach to keep everything constantly educational."


